Celebrating 70-year bond between Aston Martin and Newport Pagnell

A unique gathering of more than 100 classic Aston Martin and Lagonda models provided the centrepiece for 70th anniversary celebrations at Aston Martin Works in Newport Pagnell recently.

The heritage home of the British marque and the place where many of its most famous models of the 20th Century were manufactured is this year marking another exceptional milestone: the 70th anniversary of the brand's presence at its site in Buckinghamshire and on Saturday (11 October) owners of cars manufactured during the 50-plus years that Newport Pagnell housed the Aston Martin factory, as well as what was then known as its Service Division, were invited to the site to mark the occasion.



The former global headquarters of Aston Martin Lagonda, a modest mock Tudor building on Tickford Street known affectionately as 'Sunnyside' was the focal point for many, with an exceptional selection of DB6s gathered together there.

Meanwhile DB4 and DB5 owners were asked to position their cars in front of the Aston Martin Works showroom opposite Sunnyside with V12 Vanquish, V8 and Lagonda drivers forming their own equally impressive displays around the rest of the Works site.

Add a smattering of DB 2/4 and DB Mk III's, the odd V550 and V600, and you have every major model built on the site represented.

The Aston Martin Owners Club were present in force, of course, and kindly operated a 'relaxed concours' competition on the day, involving a team of scrutineers led by AMOC Chief Judge Michael Reed. Prize-giving at the conclusion of the day's events saw a number of owners leave with trophies. Meanwhile all those present received a commemorative pin badge, and specially designed poster print, as mementoes of their day.

The Works team ensured every area of the business was open throughout, with visitors able to peek 'behind the scenes' in the Modern and Heritage Workshops, Panel, Trim and Paint Shops, witness ongoing restorations and even purchase parts, accessories and souvenirs from a specially-created stand adjacent to the on-site Parts department.

Those with an eye for detail will have seen body bucks and an English Wheel or two as well: all referencing the traditional techniques and artisan expertise that have been handed down at Newport Pagnell for generations.

Reflecting on the success of the day Aston Martin Works President, Paul Spires, said: "We wanted the 70th anniversary event to be a memorable occasion for all concerned, but I don't think any of us envisaged it being quite such a special affair!

"The chats with our superb guest speakers, the enthusiasm and dedication of the Works staff, and the exceptional commitment of our guests, some of whom who had travelled hundreds of miles to be with us on Saturday, really does speak volumes about the affection for Newport Pagnell as a key part of the Aston Martin Lagonda story."

The Fellowship is organising a visit to the Aston Martin Heritage Trust on 19th March next year, (see 'Events' panel above). **NB.** The Trust is situated in Wallingford, Oxfordshire, and is **NOT** the site described in this news item.

Ferrari looks forward, and back!

Maranello lifts the hood on EV tech in maiden electric car

Ferrari has unveiled the technology which will power its hotly-anticipated first electric car, the Elettrica, as the 78-year-old luxury Italian sportscar maker looks to add battery power to its hybrid and petrol-engine models.

In a closely-guarded event at its Maranello headquarters, a Ferrari-red cover was pulled back on a stage to reveal the Elettrica's production-ready chassis: a car base, with battery pack and electric motor, though with no wheels or outer shell.

The completed car, which Ferrari is expected to present next year at a global premiere, will have a top speed of 310 kilometres per hour (193 miles) - slightly slower than most of its engined models and a range of at least 530 km.

The four-door, four-plus seat car will have a specially-designed sound system to amplify actual vibrations from its powertrain to create a distinctly electric Ferrari sound, rather than just faking engine noise.

The unveiling of the inner workings of Ferrari's maiden electric car marks a milestone for the auto industry that is grappling more widely with a shift from the internal combustion engine to the electric battery.

"Today... is an historic day for us. We all have goosebumps," said CEO Benedetto Vigna, who said the electric car would complement, not replace, the company's existing models. "The EV is an addition, not a transition."

Like other high-performance brands, Ferrari has been cautious about electrification. Reuters reported in June that it had delayed a second EV model until 2028 because of a lack of demand. Rival Lamborghini, part of Volkswagen, has delayed its first EV until 2029, saying the market is not ready.

The Ferrari Elettrica, expected to cost at least 500,000 euros (£434,000); Ferrari began selling hybrid models in 2019.

Meanwhile, the Italian supercar maker illustrated its continuing love affair with conventionally engined cars, unveiling the SC40, a 'clear homage' to Ferrari's defining '80s supercar, the F4 F40.

However, there's a limit to how close the tribute act can get to the deliberately raw, steel-tubed original, not least because it must make do with the cutting-edge underpinnings of the 296 GTB. That means no twin-turbocharged V8 either, but rather the electrically assisted V6 with its eight-speed F1 DCT and 830hp output, and with it the technical requirements for cooling and safety parameters. The F40, to quote Gordon Murray, felt like a 'big go-kart with a plastic body on it'. Safe to assume the SC40 doesn't.

The key to this homage is at the front, where Ferrari has worked hard to emulate the F40's distinctive headlight placement. It's a shame the SC40 doesn't get pop-up headlamps, though the decision to integrate them into a black housing that spans the entire front bumper certainly gives the car a distinctive look.
